

The Humble Petition of the Parish Council  
of Torrington and Wigganthurpe and the Chairman  
and Overseers of the Parish Meeting of Ganthorpe  
both in the County and Diocese of York being the Burial  
Authorities for the Civil Parishes of Torrington with  
Wigganthurpe aforesaid and of Ganthorpe aforesaid  
respectively

Your Petitioners Humbly Pray Your Grace to Consecrate as a  
Burial Ground for the said Parishes of Torrington with Wigganthurpe and  
Ganthorpe the piece of land situate in the said Parish of Torrington containing  
3780 square yards coloured round with a red verge line on the plan attached  
hereto and more particularly described in the Deed dated the twenty seventh day  
of November One thousand nine hundred and five by which the same was conveyed  
to your Petitioners and of which they are now seized in fee simple.
